How to Transport Your HHW Materials:

- Do not mix chemicals together.
- Keep chemicals in original containers with label intact, if possible. If product is missing original label or contents cannot be identified, label it as "unknown."
- If a chemical leaks, secure it in a secondary leak-proof container or clear plastic bag.
- Package chemicals securely in non-leaking containers or boxes. Do not combine all of your chemicals in a trash bag. This could cause a fire or chemical reaction.
- Please limit the size of each container to no more than 5 gallons.
- During transport, place the container in a well ventilated space away from the driver and passengers, such as a trunk or bed of vehicle.

Household Hazardous Waste



What is Household Hazardous Waste (HHW)?

Household Hazardous Wastes are products that are commonly found throughout the typical home, garage, or storage shed. Often, these chemicals are flammable, corrosive, reactive, and create toxic environments. These chemicals should never be disposed in the regular garbage or dumped down a drain. These chemicals can contaminate our drinking water supply as well as Monroe County's sensitive eco system. Below are examples of common household hazardous products.

What Not To Bring?

- Ammunition, flares, loose pills and old medications (bring to Sheriff's substation)
- Sharps and needles (follow Floridahealth.gov guidelines for proper handling)
- No More than 220 lbs. or 25 gallons of HHW

Types of Acceptable Household Hazardous Waste:

Paints:

Liquid paints can cause big messes when mixed with trash as some paints are flammable or contain toxic metals. Take to a HHW drop-off area. Alternatively, latex paint can be dried out and thrown away with your household garbage. Remove lid and add sand, cat litter or sawdust to absorb liquid. Leave uncovered in garbage.



Used Cooking Oil:

Used cooking oil can harm septic tanks and clog sewers. It can also be used to make a variety of products including new fuel. Take to the HHW facility.



Fuel and Gasoline:

Containers of fuel or gas up to 25 gallons can be taken to the HHW facility.



Yard Products:

Fertilizers, Herbicides, Pesticides, Poisons.

Household Products:

Adhesives, Aerosols, Cleaners, Hair dyes, Rubbing alcohol, Solvents, Peroxides, Drain openers.



Electronics (E-Waste):

Computers, Monitors, Printers, Televisions, Telephones, Clocks, Speakers, Scanners. Almost anything with a cord can be recycled at the HHW facility.



Mercury Bulbs:

Compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs), Fluorescent lamps, Mercury thermometers or thermostats.



Auto/ Marine Products:

Antifreeze, Motor Oil, Waxes, Cleaners, Polishes.



Batteries:

Lead-acid, Rechargeable (Ni-Cd, Li-Ion, Ni-MH, Lithium)

NOTE: Single-use alkaline batteries (AA, C, D) may be discarded in the regular trash.
